Annual Report

Contextual Information

Kururrungku Catholic Education Centre is located in the Aboriginal community of Billiluna in the Kimberley region of Western Australia. Billiluna is situated around 175km south-west of Halls Creek with access via the Tanami Road.

Kururrungku CEC is the only education provider in the community and has sixty-nine students enrolled in classes from 3-year-old kindergarten through to Year 10. There is no school council with school-based decisions made by the teaching staff and Aboriginal teaching assistants.

Workforce Composition

Kururrungku CEC employs a principal and five teachers, one of whom adopts the mantle of Religious Education Co-ordinator. The school also employs five Aboriginal teaching assistants, one Aboriginal community teacher, who specialises in culture and language, three groundmen and a cook/cleaner. The principal, two teachers, one Aboriginal teaching assistant, the groundmen and the cook/cleaner are male while the Aboriginal community teacher and four Aboriginal teaching assistants are female.

The teachers at Kururrungku CEC are very well credentialed with a range of qualifications as listed below:

Student Attendance at School

Student attendance, as with many remote communities, is always a challenge with many students absent from school for various reasons during the year (Lore, Royalties, Family travelling).

Many of our senior students choose to undertake their senior education at boarding schools in Perth or Albany, often with good success. It is difficult to engage those senior age students who remain in Billiluna, particularly those who have been through Lore.

The average school attendance sits at a disappointing 26.62%, which breaks down as follows:

Kindergarten – 17.56% Prep – 23.05% Yr 1 – 13.83% Yr 2 – 42.16% Yr 3 – 64.48% Yr 4 – 38.38% Yr 5 – 34.71% Yr 6 – 34.22% Yr 7 – 13 66% Yr 8 – 15 62% Yr 9 – 8.15%

Non-attendance is an ongoing issue for the school and a number of strategies are employed in an effort to encourage more children to attend school. Breakfast, a mid-morning snack, lunch and an afternoon snack are all provided by the school and there have been incentive raffles with vouchers for the local store as prizes. A school vehicle is driven around the community for an hour, following the start of the school day, to pick up stragglers. There had been some discussion between the school and East Kimberley Job Pathways which aimed to provide hands on activities for secondary students but, unfortunately, the recent closure of the EKJP centre has led to the postponement of those initiatives.
